

June - Month of the Sacred Heart



The Sacred Heart – a symbol of God's love, a mirror of compassion, an invitation to mercy (An article by Joe Higgins, The Catholic Leader. Painting by Pompei Battoni, 1767, Church of the Gesù, Rome)

The essence of Christ's boundless love for humanity is found in the devotion to His Most Sacred Heart. The devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus originated in the revelations received by St Margaret Mary Alacoque in the 17th century, who experienced visions of Christ's Sacred Heart, calling for love, reparation, and devotion. Since then, the devotion has spread throughout the Church. Here are three ways to contemplate His Most Sacred Heart – as a symbol of God's love, as a mirror of our true place in God's plan, and as an invitation to live more mercifully.

Symbolically, the heart has long been regarded as the centre of love, both in a physical and metaphorical sense. In the devotion to the Sacred Heart, the heart of Jesus represents the divine wellspring of love, the source from which

flows an abundance of compassion, mercy, and grace. It is the heart that symbolises the core of Christ's message – love God above all and love your neighbour as yourself.

Often depicted within the image of the Sacred Heart is a flame, representing the burning fire of divine love. This flame signifies the intensity and transformative power of God's love, capable of purifying and enkindling our hearts. It calls us to a fervent love, one that is ardent and all-consuming, yet profoundly gentle and self-sacrificial. It reminds us of Christ's suffering and the depths of His sacrificial love and His Kingship of the Universe.

This crown represents the pain and rejection Jesus endured, willingly embracing the weight of humanity's sins upon His shoulders.

Atop the heart is the cross — the ultimate symbol of Christ's self-giving love. The cross represents not only the suffering and death of Jesus but also the triumph of the resurrection. It is through the cross that Christ's sacrificial love conquers sin and death, opening the gates of eternal life.

In the image of the Sacred Heart, we encounter not only the profound essence of Christ's love but also a reflection of our own calling to embody that love in our daily lives. Pope Benedict XVI beautifully captured this truth when he proclaimed, "Only when we meet the living God in Christ do we know what life is".

Within the devotion to the Sacred Heart, we discover that authentic life is found in self-giving love, in wholeheartedly embracing the needs of others with compassion and tenderness. The Sacred Heart serves as a reminder of the indispensable role of love in our relationships—with God and with our fellow human beings. It beckons us to transcend our self-interest and to embrace the needs of others, particularly those who are marginalised and suffering.

The image of the Sacred Heart compels us to go beyond mere sentimentality or superficial acts of kindness, urging us to enter into the depths of compassionate love. By gazing upon the Sacred Heart and allowing its image to permeate our hearts, we are transformed into vessels of divine love, radiating Christ's compassion to the world. The Sacred Heart becomes a mirror that reflects not only the perfect fusion of divinity and humanity in Christ but also our own reflection as bearers of God's love.

Within the devotion to the Sacred Heart, we find a path paved with mercy - a call to forgive, heal, and reconcile. It is through Christ's heart, wounded for our sake, that we are offered the gift of reconciliation with God and with one another. In a world often marked by division and discord, the Sacred Heart reminds us that the power of love can mend what is broken, heal what is wounded, and restore what is lost. By embodying mercy, we become agents of transformation, extending God's forgiveness and compassion to those who yearn for solace and redemption.

Altar Society

Gospel

Mark 4:26-34 A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Jesus said to the crowds, 'This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man throws seed on the land. Night and day, while he sleeps, when he is awake, the seed is sprouting and growing; how, he does not know. Of its own accord the land produces first the shoot, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the crop is ready, he loses no time; he starts to reap because the harvest has come.'

He also said, 'What can we say the kingdom of God is like? What parable can we find for it? It is like a mustard seed which at the time of its sowing in the soil is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet once it is sown it grows into the biggest shrub of them all and puts out big branches so that the birds of the air can shelter in its shade.'

Using many parables like these, he spoke the word to them, so far as they were capable of understanding it. He would not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything to his disciples when they were alone.
