Reflection on the 15th Sunday of Ordinary Time by Father Gabriel of St Mary Magdalen, O.C.D.

Lord, may your word be in my mouth and in my heart, so that I may do it (Dt 30:14)

God's law is the axis around which today's Liturgy revolves. "You will obey the voice of the Lord your God, keeping his commandments and his statutes" (Dt 30:10). God did not remain aloof from the life of man, but stooped down to him, set up a covenant with him, and made his will known in the law. It was not an abstract law, imposed solely from without, but inscribed in the heart of man from the first moment of creation; hence it was a law in harmony with his nature, responding to his essential needs, and suited to leading him toward full realization of himself according to God's purpose for him. "For this commandment which I command you this day"—says the sacred text—"is not too hard for you, neither is it far off. . . . But the word is very near you; it is in your mouth and in your heart, so that you can do it" (ib. 11:14).

The word then became inexpressibly near to man when God's eternal Word, his only Son, was made flesh and came to set up his dwelling among men, revealing to them in the fullest way the divine will as set forth in the Commandments, teaching them how to practice these with perfection. The Gospel of the day (Lk 10:25-37) shows us Jesus in conversation with a doctor of the law about the greatest commandment: love for God and for our neighbor. He questioned the Master, not from a desire to learn, but "to put him to the test" (ib. 25); he ended his inquiry by asking: "And who is my neighbor?" (ib. 29). Jesus did not answer with a definition, but with the story of a poor fellow who had been set upon by brigands, and robbed, and left half dead by the roadside. Two men passed him by—a priest and a Levite—they saw him, but went on their way without bothering to do anything for him; only a Samaritan took pity on him and stopped to help him.

The conclusion is clear: we are not to make distinctions, either of religion or nationality, of friend or foe; anyone in need of help is our "neighbor" and must be loved as we each love ourselves. In addition the parable forced the doctor of the law to recognize that the law itself had been fulfilled, not by men who were especially learned in it like the priest and the Levite, but by a Samaritan whom the Jews looked upon as an unbeliever and a sinner; it was this very person who was being proposed as a model to those of pharisaic mentality who considered themselves just, sinless observers of the law. "Go and do likewise," Jesus told him. Indeed, it matters little if we know moral law perfectly and can discuss it and philosophize about it, if, in actual fact, we do not know how to put our most basic obligations into practice in cases that are as clear and urgent as the one brought out by the parable. The hardhearted and the selfish will always find a thousand excuses to shirk helping their neighbor, especially when doing so is inconvenient and requires sacrifice.

The second reading (Col 1:15-20) treats of an entirely different subject; it celebrates the greatness of Christ: his absolute supremacy over everything which had been created "through him and for him" (ib. 16), his sovereignty over men who are reconciled with God "through him" and redeemed "by the blood of his cross" (ib. 20). Yet we can see a relationship to today's Gospel: Jesus, "the image of the invisible God, the first-born of all creation," wishes to be acknowledged and loved by men in so humble and visible an image as our neighbor. "As you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me" (Mt 25:40); this amounts to saving that a Christian must love his neighbor not only as himself, but as he is bound to love the Lord himself.

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus, 'do this and life is yours.'

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said, "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him,' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go and do the same yourself.'
