Reflection on 26th Sunday of Ordinary Time by Father Gabriel of St Mary Magdalen, O.C.D.

Lord, may I not aim at worldly advantages, but at righteousness, godliness, faith, and love (1 Tim 6:11)

Today's Liturgy is a warning to be mindful of the awful consequences of a lax and pleasure-seeking life. In the first reading (Amos 6:1a, 4-7) we hear again the caustic reproaches of the prophet Amos to the rich who give themselves up to comfort and luxury, bent on extracting all the pleasure that life can offer. He describes them as idling away their lives in eating, singing, and drinking, with no anxiety over their country which was falling into ruin; he prophesied: "Therefore they shall now be the first of those to go into exile, and the revelry of those who stretch themselves shall pass away" (ib. 7). The prophecy was to come true thirty years later, and be one of the many lessons history has given us about the social and political ruin that is caused by moral decadence. And still our present comfort-loving civilization seems not to have understood this very well.

But there is a yet more important lesson: a life enclosed within the narrow horizons of earthly pleasures is itself a denial of faith; it is godlessness and atheism in practice, with a consequent lack of concern for the needs of others. In short, it is the road to ruin for time and for eternity. This latter aspect is illustrated by the Gospel (Lk 16:19-31) with the parable that compares the life of a pleasure-seeker with that of a poor man. At first sight, the rich feaster seems to have had no other sin than an excessive attachment to luxury and good food; but a closer examination reveals an absolute indifference to God and to neighbor. All his thoughts and apprehensions revolve around his "feasting sumptuously" (ib. 19), without the least concern for the unfortunate Lazarus, languishing at his door. As for this latter, although the parable does not state it explicitly, it is easy to recognize in him one of those poor who accept their lot with resignation, trusting in God. Thus when death overtook him, Lazarus was "carried by the angels to Abraham's bosom" (ib. 22), while the rich man was engulfed in punishment (ib. 23). The conversation that followed between the rich man, now parched with thirst, and his father Abraham, underscored the inexorable fixity of our eternal end in correspondence with the attitude we have freely taken during our life. Those who have believed in God and placed their trust in him will receive from him an eternal reward; those who have given themselves to pleasure, acting as if God did not exist, will be separated from him for all eternity. It is an obvious conclusion that instead of poverty and suffering being signs of rejection by God, they are means he uses to induce us to seek the better things and to put all our hope in him. Prosperity and wealth, on the contrary, often make a person arrogant and scornful of God and his eternal rewards; they are a noose that suffocates all yearning for higher truths.

Luke 16:19-31

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus said to the Pharisees: 'There was a rich man who used to dress in purple and fine linen and feast magnificently every day. And at his gate there lay a poor man called Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to fill himself with the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even came and licked his sores. Now the poor man died and was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried.

'In his torment in Hades he looked up and saw Abraham a long way off with Lazarus in his bosom. So he cried out, "Father Abraham, pity me and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am in agony in these flames." "My son," Abraham replied "remember that during your life good things come your way, just as bad things came the way of Lazarus. Now he is being comforted here while you are in agony. But that is not all: between us and you a great gulf has been fixed, to stop anyone, if he wanted to, crossing from our side to yours, and to stop any crossing from your side to ours."

'The rich man replied, "Father, I beg you then to send Lazarus to my father's house, since I have five brothers, to give them warning, so that they do not come to this place of torment too." "They have Moses and the prophets," said Abraham "let them listen to them." "Ah no, father Abraham," said the rich man "but if someone comes to them from the dead, they will repent." Then Abraham said to him, "If they will not listen either to Moses or to the prophets, they will not be convinced even if someone should rise from the dead.""
