Reflection on 28th Sunday of Ordinary Time by Father Gabriel of St Mary Magdalen, O.C.D.

Lord, you have made known your salvation; the ends of the earth have contemplated it (Ps 98:2-3)

Grace, gratitude, the gift of faith, and the life of faith are the themes that are interwoven in today's Liturgy. The first reading (2 Kg 5; 14-17) recalls the case of Naaman of Syria who was healed of leprosy by the prophet Elisha. God made use of this miracle to reveal himself to the pagan unbeliever, and to call him to the faith. Submissive to grace, he responded by an interior conversion, and loudly proclaimed that the God of Israel was the one true God: "Behold, I know that there is no God in all the earth but in Israel" (ib. 15). Then, as a mark of gratitude, he wished to offer a gift to the prophet, who had been the instrument of his cure. But Elisha, completely disinterested in any reward, refused it. A true man of God, Elisha—like every true prophet—did not want to profit from the gratitude of believers, to gain either riches or fame for himself. In his first discourse in the synagogue of Nazareth, Jesus cites the incident of the healing of Naaman the Syrian (Lk 4:27)—the only one healed by Elisha in preference to the many Israelites who were also lepers—in order to demonstrate that salvation is not a privilege reserved to the Jews, but a gift offered to all men.

A similar situation would occur later when, on his last journey to Jerusalem, Jesus would heal ten lepers, of whom only one—a foreigner—would repeat Naaman's act of gratitude and, together with his physical cure, receive also the gift of salvation (Lk 17:11-19; Gospel). This group of ten miserable men found Jesus and, "standing at a distance, and lifting up their voices, said: 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us'" (ib. 12-13). It was a cry of confidence in that Jesus of whose miracles they had heard so much, whose compassion for human suffering had been so extolled; it was a cry that would be heard. But the Lord laid down one condition: "Go and show yourselves to the priests" (ib. 14). What the Mosaic law required from lepers already cleansed as proof of their cure, (Lev 14:2)

Jesus asked of these ten even before they were healed, thus stressing the importance of obedience to the law. And as they set out to fulfill his command, they were cured. The cure was identical for them all, but their response to it was not. "Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice; and he fell on his face at Jesus' feet, giving him thanks. Now he was a Samaritan" (Lk 17:15-16). The other nine felt no need to return and give thanks; was it perhaps that precisely because they belonged to the chosen people, they felt that God's gifts were due them?

On the other hand, the Samaritan, a foreigner, did not dare to claim any rights, and considering himself unworthy of God's favor, accepted his cure with a humble and grateful heart. This attitude of humility and gratitude prepared him for the greater gifts of salvation: "Rise and go your way"—said Jesus—"your faith has made you well" (ib. 19). Time and time again Sacred Scripture declares that the gift of faith is not connected with any one people or any one condition in life. "The word of God is not fettered!" (2 Tim 2:8-13); nothing can prevent it from taking root and arousing faith in the hearts of even those most alien to the world of the faithful.

But St. Paul also speaks of another obligation of the life of faith: to look upon suffering, particularly that which comes from loyalty to Christ, not as an enemy but as something to glory in, as the sure means of entering into the orbit of salvation. "The saying is sure: if we have died for him, we shall also live with him; if we endure, we shall also reign with him" (ib. 11-12).



This made Jesus say, 'Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner.' And he said to the man, 'Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you.'
