Reflection on 29th Sunday of Ordinary Time by Father Gabriel of St Mary Magdalen, O.C.D.

My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth (Ps 121:2) The Scriptural texts, today, are centered around the theme of faith, considered particularly as trustful recourse to God and confidence in his intervention. From the Book of Exodus (17:8-13; 1st reading) is taken the well-known episode of Moses' prayer on the mountain while the sons of Israel in the valley below go out to do battle with the followers of Amalek. "Whenever Moses held up his hands in prayer, Israel prevailed; and whenever he lowered his hands, Amalek prevailed" (ib. 11). The upraised hands were a "sign" of the prayer offered up to God to invoke his help, and in the meanwhile since Moses "held the rod of God in his hand" (ib. 9) with which he had performed so many wonders—his hands were an incentive to the people to fight courageously. Therefore, to prevent weariness from causing Moses to lower them, "Aaron and Hur held up his hands, one on one side, and the other on the other side" (ib. 12). It was an admirable expression of faith, through which they expected victory much more from God's help than from the bravery of their warriors. The Gospel passage relates the parable of the judge and the widow (Lk 18:1-8), which Jesus proposed in order to inculcate "the duty to pray always and not lose heart" (ib. 1). It was about a judge "who neither feared God" nor paid any attention to upholding the cause of the weak and the oppressed as divine law prescribed. He did not want to take any notice of a poor widow who had recourse to him for justice, but he finally gave in to her entreaties, only to get rid of her annoyance, else she "would wear him out by her continual coming" (ib. 5). Jesus went on from this example to make us understand that God, much more than the unjust judge, will listen to the entreaties of those who have recourse to him with trusting perseverance. "And will not God vindicate his elect, who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long over them? I tell you, he will vindicate them speedily" (ib. 7-8). The continual prayer that Jesus was stressing here is especially prayer for the coming of God's kingdom, for the salvation of the elect, when, on the last day, the Son of Man will come to judge the world (cf preceding passage: Lk 17:22-37). The faithful should live in expectation of that day and pray unceasingly that it may be a day of salvation. On God's side, salvation is assured because Christ has died and risen again for the whole human race. On the side of man, however, a condition is required: faith. "Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?" (ib. 8). The question with which Jesus concludes the parable induces serious reflection. The Church, in tribulation, can be sure that her unceasing supplication for salvation will be heard in the end. God will do justice for his elect even if at the present moment he permits them to undergo persecution, anguish, and failure, just as he permitted for his Chosen One, Jesus Christ. However, the Church and each individual believer must keep their faith whole and defend it against the insidious snares of discouragement. The more God finds a strong, sure faith in them, the more he will intervene in their favor, as he did in Israel's favor. In this context the second reading (2 Tim 3:14; 4:2) rings out like an impassioned exhortation to remain steadfast in faith, in spite of contrary ideas and its abandonment by many. "But as for you, continue in what you have learned"—writes St. Paul to Timothy, who is now acquainted with the sacred writings which give instruction "for the salvation" which is "through faith in Jesus Christ" (ib. 3:14-15). Those who remain steadfast in the word of God will not waver, but will be protected against every assault and will be "equipped for every good work"

The Church has dedicated the month of November to the Holy Souls. The Holy Souls are those who have died in the state of grace but who are not yet free from all punishment due to their unforgiven venial sins and all

other sins already forgiven for which satisfaction is still to be made. They are certain of entering Heaven, but first they must suffer in Purgatory. The Holy Souls cannot help themselves because for them the night has come, when no man can work (John 9:4). It is our great privilege of brotherhood that we can shorten their time of separation from God by our prayers, good works, and, especially, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

<u>Please note:</u> The names in November Mass Offerings will not be published in the parish bulletin. They will be written on a list to be placed on the church noticeboards.


All Saints' Day



First Reading

Exodus 17:8-13

A reading from the book of Exodus

The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. I, meanwhile, will stand on the hilltop, the staff of God in my hand.' Joshua did as Moses told him and marched out to engage Amalek, while Moses and Aaron and Hur went up to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage; when he let his arms fall, the advantage went to Amalek. But Moses arms grew heavy, so they took a stone and put it under him and on this he sat, Aaron and Hur supporting his arms, one on one side, one on the other; and his arms remained firm till sunset. With the edge of the sword Joshua cut down Amalek and his people.

Second Reading

2 Timothy 3:14 - 4:2

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to Timothy

You must keep to what you have been taught and know to be true; remember who your teachers were, and how, ever since you were a child, you have known the holy scriptures –

from these you can learn the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and can profitably be used for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives and teaching them to be holy. This is how the man who is dedicated to God becomes fully equipped and ready for any good work.

Before God and before Christ Jesus who is to be judge of the living and the dead, I put this duty to you, in the name of his Appearing and of his kingdom: proclaim the message and, welcome or unwelcome, insist on it. Refute falsehood, correct error, call to obedience – but do all with patience and with the intention of teaching.

Gospel

Luke 18:1-8

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the need to pray continually and never lose heart. 'There was a judge in a certain town' he said 'who had neither fear of God nor respect for man. In the same town there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, "I want justice from you against my enemy!" For a long time he refused, but at last he said to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for man, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will persist in coming and worry me to death.""

And the Lord said, 'You notice what the unjust judge has to say? Now will not God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night even when he delays to help them? I promise you, he will see justice done to them, and done speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith on earth?'
