Reflection on the 4th Sunday In Ordinary Time by Father Gabriel of St Mary Magdalen, O.C.D.

FOURTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME YEAR A Save us, O Lord our God . . . that we may give thanks to your holy name (Ps 106:47)

After announcing God's punishment to sinning Israel, Zephaniah gives a word of hope: "Seek the Lord, all you humble of the land" (2:3). Salvation is offered to the humble; God will scatter the proud and the rebellious, and only a "remnant" will remain of Israel, a "remnant" made up of the humble and the poor. "I will leave in the midst of you a people humble and lowly, who shall seek refuge in the name of the Lord" (Zeph 3:12). Jesus has come to bring salvation to this "remnant," to these "poor and lowly ones;" so it is not surprising that the sermon on the mount opens with the joyous message: "Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (Mt 5:3).

However, we quickly note an important specification. It is not material poverty that he calls blessed, but that spiritual disposition—that being "poor in spirit"—by which we base our trust, not on ourselves nor on worldly goods, but upon God. Material poverty is blessed only to the extent that it leads to this interior attitude.

The other beatitudes are to be understood in the same way. "Blessed are those who mourn," that is, those who accept the trials of life, recognizing that God has the right to try them through suffering, without in any way doubting his fatherly love. "Blessed are the meek," who although poor and afflicted, are not rebellious nor tempted to procure a better situation for themselves through violent means or by trying to overcome others. "Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness," not because they want to claim what is theirs, but rather because they aspire to a justice that is a virtue, a greater holiness. "Blessed are the merciful," since, aware of their own need of God's mercy, they know how to compassionate and sympathetically excuse the faults of others. "Blessed are the pure in heart," for their souls are not darkened by passion and sin, and thus they are capable of understanding the things of God. "Blessed are the peacemakers," who, since they are at peace with God and with themselves, sow the seed of peace wherever they go. "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake," who suffer for a just cause, for their faith, for the Gospel.

Ah these categories of persons have an essential attitude in common, which makes them apt for the kingdom of heaven and open to God. Rather than trust in their own material or moral resources these put their trust in God; rather than seek their satisfaction in the goods of earth, they live in expectation of those of heaven.

To these are promised God, his kingdom and his mercy, the vision of the Godhead and everlasting happiness. To be numbered among these "blessed," we must have the right dispositions, without which one cannot be a disciple of Christ, nor be saved by him.




The Feast of the Presentation of The Lord

Forty days after Christmas the infant Jesus was presented in the temple of Jerusalem and placed in the arms of the old man Simeon (Luke 2:22-40) who declared:

*Lord, you now have set your servant free
to go in peace as you have promised;
For these eyes of mine have seen the Savior,
whom you have prepared for all the world to see:
A Light to enlighten the nations,
and the glory of your people Israel.*

In the Church, this day is celebrated on February 2, forty days after Jesus' birth. It is a major feast and is variously known as the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple, the Feast of Meeting, the Purification of Mary, and Candlemas. Each name highlights a particular aspect of the day.

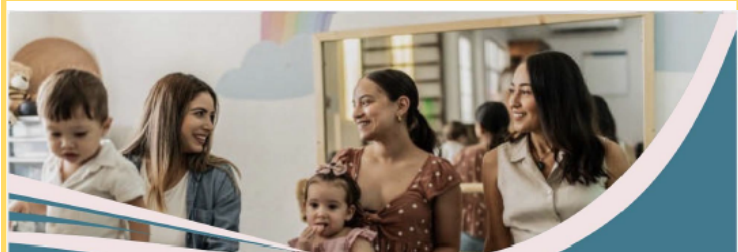
